Oshogatsu (Japanese New Year)	Recognized as Japanese New Year based on the Gregorian calendar.
New Year's Day	New Year's Day, the first day of the year according to the modern Gregorian calendar, celebrated within most Western countries.
World Braille Day	Raise awareness of the importance of braille as a means for communication for blind and partially sighted people.
Epiphany or Dia de los Reyes (Three Kings Day)	A holiday observed by Eastern and Western Christians that recognizes the visit of the three wise men to the baby Jesus 12 days after his birth.
Christmas (Armenian Orthodox)	Christmas, recognized on this day by Armenian Orthodox Christians, who celebrate the birth of Jesus on Epiphany.
Korean American Day	Commemorates the arrival of the first Korean immigrants to the United States in 1903. The day also honors the Korean American's immense contributions to every aspect of society.
Lori-Maghi	Annual festival celebrated by the Sikhs commemorating the memory of 40 Sikh martyrs.
Makar Sankranti	A major harvest festival celebrated in various parts of India
First US Coronavirus Case	COVID-19: CDC Confirms First US Coronavirus Case

World Religion Day	Recognizing the oneness of religion and the belief that world religion will unify the peoples of the earth.
Tu B'shevat or or Rosh HaShanah La'llanot	(sundown to sundown) Tu B'shevat or or Rosh HaShanah La'llanot, a Jewish holiday recognizing "The New Year of the Trees." It is celebrated on the 15th day of the Hebrew month of Shevat. In Israel, the flowering of the almond tree usually coincides with this holiday, which is observed by planting trees and eating dried fruits and nuts.
Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Day	The birthday of civil rights activist Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. is on January 15th but it is observed on the third Monday in January.
Mahayana New Year	Holiday celebrated by the Mahayana Buddhist branch, on the first full-moon day in January.
International Holocaust Remembrance Day	International Day of Commemoration in memory of the victims of the Holocaust coinciding with the anniversary of the liberation of the Auschwitz death camp in 1945.
National Mentoring Month	Focus on how we can all work together to increase the number of mentors to make sure young people in our communities have dependable people to look up to and follow in their footsteps.
National Braille Literacy Month	Recognize and honor the legally blind and visually impaired for National Braille Literacy Month. The mission of this month is to raise awareness of the importance of Braille to the blind and visually impaired community.

	Mardi Gras	The last day for Catholics to indulge before Ash Wednesday starts the sober weeks of fasting that accompany Lent. The term "Mardi Gras" is particularly associated with the carnival celebrations in New Orleans, Louisiana.
	Losar	Tibetan Buddhist New Year
	International Women's Day	Celebration of the economic, political and social achievements of women worldwide.
	Asian American and Pacific Islander Women's Equal Pay Day	The aim is to raise awareness about the pay gap between Asian American and Pacific Islander women and White men. Asian American and Pacific Islander women are paid 85 cents for every dollar paid to white men.
	Maha Shivarati	Hindu festival celebrated each year to honor Lord Shiva. It is celebrated just before the arrival of spring. It is also known as the Great Night of Shiva or Shivaratri and is one of the largest and most significant among the sacred festival nights of India.
	Lailat al Miraj	Muslim holiday that commemorates the prophet Muhammad's nighttime journey from Mecca to the "Farthest Mosque" in Jerusalem, where he ascended to heaven, was purified, and given the instruction for Muslims to pray five times daily. Note that in the Muslim calendar, a holiday begins on the sunset of the previous day.
	Lailat al Bara'a also known as Lailat Al Baraah, Barat, or popularly as Shab-e-Bara or Night of Forgiveness	Islamic holiday during which practitioners of the faith seek forgiveness for sins. Muslims spend the night in special prayers. It is regarded as one of the most sacred nights on the Islamic calendar.
	Holi	A spring festival in India and Nepal dedicated to the god of pleasure, also known as the festival of colors or the festival of sharing love.
	Purim	A Jewish celebration that marks the time when the Jewish community living in Persia was saved from genocide. On Purim, Jewish people offer charity and share food with friends.

International Day for the Elimination of Racial Discrimination	Call to action to eliminate all forms of racial discrimination worldwide.
National Single Parent Day	Honor and recognize the hard work, devotion and sacrifices of single parenting.
World Down Syndrome Day	Assemble and organize activities to promote public awareness for the genetic disorder. The goal is to educate others of the importance of supporting our friends and family who have directly and indirectly experienced life with the condition.
Naw-Rúz	The Bahá'í New Year is a holiday celebrated on the vernal equinox. It is one of the nine Bahá'í holy days on which work is suspended.
International Day of Remembrance of the Victims of Slavery and the Transatlantic Slave Trade	A United Nations international observation that offers the opportunity to honor and remember those who suffered and died at the hands of the brutal slavery system. First observed in 2008, the international day also aims to raise awareness about the dangers of racism and prejudice today.
Epilepsy Awareness Day	Increase awareness and understanding of issues affecting people with intellectual and developmental disabilities
National Vietnam War Veterans Day	Honors the men and women who served and sacrificed during the longest conflict in United States history.
International Transgender  Day of Visibility	Bring awareness to transgender people and their identities
Cesar Chavez Day	Honors Mexican American farm worker, labor leader and activist Cesar Chavez (1927–1993) who was a nationally respected voice for social justice.
National Invest in Veterans Week	Honor aspiring and established veteran business owners and their contributions to the economy.
National Introverts Week	Dedicated to confronting the stigma associated with introversion and to celebrate the inherent strengths and qualities that make introverts such a dynamic and successful part of our world

	National Women's History Month	Honors women as significant agents of historical change.

Breonna Taylor	Breonna Taylor, a 26-year-old emergency medical technician, was shot eight times when officers raided her apartment in Louisville, Kentucky.
Stephon Clark	Stephon Clark was killed after being shot at least seven times in his grandmother's backyard in Sacramento, California, by police who were investigating a nearby break-in.
Atlanta Spa Shooting	On March 16, 2021, a shooting spree occurred at three spas or massage parlors in the metropolitan area of Atlanta, Georgia. Eight people were killed, six of whom were Asian women, and one other person was wounded. A suspect, 21-year-old Robert Aaron Long, was taken into custody later that day.

	World Autism Awareness Day	Speak out against discrimination, celebrate the diversity of our global community and strengthen our commitment to the full inclusion and participation of people with autism.
	Equal Pay Day (United States)	To raise awareness about the raw wage gap, the figure that shows that women, on average, earn about 80 cents for every dollar men earn. The date moves earlier each year as the wage gap closes. Equal Pay Day began in 1996 by the National Committee on Pay Equity as a public awareness event to illustrate the gender pay gap.
	Good Friday	Holy Friday commemorates the Crucifixion of Jesus on the Friday before Easter/Pascha.
	Palm Sunday	Christian holiday commemorating the entry of Jesus into Jerusalem. It is the last Sunday of Lent and the beginning of the Holy Week.
	Easter	Celebrates the resurrection of Jesus.
	Earth Day	Annual event celebrated around the world on April 22 to demonstrate support for environmental protection.
	Songkran (Thai New Year)	Thai New Year's national holiday. Songkran is on the 13 April every year, but the holiday period extends from 14 to 15 April.
	Chinese Language Day	To celebrate multilingualism and cultural diversity. The contribution of Chinese literature, poetry and language in world culture is highlighted.
	Yom Hashoah	"Holocaust Remembrance Day" memorializes the heroic martyrdom of six million Jews who perished in the Nazi Holocaust.
	Spanish Language Day	To celebrate multilingualism and cultural diversity. Aims to highlight the richness and vitality of the Spanish language.
	National Minority Cancer Awareness Month	Dedicated to bringing awareness to the health disparities in cancer that affect racial and ethnic minority populations.

Day of Silence	Taking a vow of silence to highlight the silencing of LGBTQ people and the need for change.
Laylat al-Qadr	The holiest night of the year for Muslims, is traditionally celebrated on the 27th day of Ramadan. It is known as the Night of Power and commemorates the night that the Quran was first revealed to the prophet Muhammad.
Passover/Pesach	The eight-day "Feast of Unleavened Bread" celebrates Israel's deliverance from Egyptian bondage.
National Autism Awareness Month	Dedicated to raising understanding and acceptance of people with autism.
National Financial Literacy Month	Raises awareness about the importance of financial education
Ramadan (April 1- April 30)	Observed by Muslims worldwide as a month of fasting to commemorate the first revelation of the Qur'an to the Prophet Muhammad.
Genocide Awareness Month	A Month that marks important anniversaries for past and contemporary genocides to remember and honor victims and survivors of mass atrocities.
Arab Heritage Month	Celebrates the Arab American heritage and culture and pays tribute to the contributions of Arab Americans.
<u>Daunte Wright</u>	Daunte Wright was shot and killed in Brooklyn Center, just north of Minneapolis. After being pulled over for a traffic violation, the police told Mr Wright he was being arrested for an outstanding warrant.
Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Day	A day that gives parents an opportunity to take their children to work.



Mother's Day	Children of all ages show appreciation for their mothers and mother figures.			
International Day of Families	Opportunity to promote awareness of issues relating to families and to increase knowledge of the social, economic and demographic process affecting them.			
International Day Against Homophobia, Transphobia and Biphobia	A global celebration of sexual-orientation and gender diversities.			
World Day for Cultural Diversity	Recognizes cultural diversity as a source of innovation, exchange and creativity, as well as creating a more peaceful society.			
Harvey Milk Day	Celebrated each year on May 22 in memory of Harvey Milk, a gay rights activist assassinated in 1978. Harvey Milk was a prominent gay activist during the twentieth century.			
Memorial Day	A federal holiday in the United States for remembering the people who died while serving in the country's armed forces.			

Armed Forces Week	This week honors those who are currently serving in the US Military. Armed Forces Day is celebrated on May 21.
National Women's Health Week	Raise awareness about manageable steps women can take to improve their health.
Teacher Appreciation Week	This week celebrates our educators
Asian Pacific American Heritage Month	Recognizes the contributions and celebrates the culture of Asians and Pacific Islanders in the United States.
Jewish American Heritage Month	Recognizes the history of Jewish contributions to American culture, acknowledging the diverse achievements of American Jews.
Mental Health Awareness Month	Raise awareness of those living with mental or behavioral health issues and to help reduce the stigma of those suffering from mental health.
National Military Appreciation Month	Celebrated every May as a declaration that encourages US citizens to observe the month in a symbol of unity.
George Floyd	George Floyd was murdered after being arrested in Minneapolis and held down by police officers, one of whom had his knee on Mr Floyd's neck for more than nine minutes. The anti-racism movement created in 2013 after the killing of teenager Trayvon Martin, Black Lives Matter, was re-energized.
Tulsa Race Massacre	The Tulsa race massacre took place on May 31 and June 1, 1921, when mobs of White residents, some of them deputized and given weapons by city officials, attacked Black residents and destroyed homes and businesses of the Greenwood District in Tulsa, Oklahoma.

National PTSD Awareness Month

Global Day of Parents	Aimed to honor parents throughout the world.
Russian Language Day	The event was established by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization in 2010. UN Russian Language Day coincides with the birthday of Aleksandr Pushkin, a Russian poet who is considered the father of modern Russian literature.
Loving Day	Honoring the Supreme Court decision Loving v. Virginia which struck down the miscegenation laws remaining in 16 states barring interracial marriage.
Pulse Remembrance Day	Dedicated to the 49 angels, survivors, families, first responders, and all in the Orlando community who united in response to the tragedy.
Race Unity Day	Observance promoting racial harmony and understanding and the essential unity of humanity.
<u>Juneteenth</u>	This celebration honors the day in 1865 when slaves in Texas and Louisiana finally heard they were free, two months after the end of the Civil War. June 19, therefore, became the day of emancipation for thousands of African-Americans.
Father's Day	Children of all ages show appreciation for their father and father figures.
Anniversary of Legalization of Same-Sex marriage in the US	June 26, 2015, in the case of the Obergefell v. Hodges, Supreme Court ruled that the fundamental right to marry is guaranteed to same-sex couples.
LGBTQ+ Pride Month	Commemorates the anniversary of modern gay rights movement in the US being initiated. Promotion of self-affirmation, dignity, equality, and increased visibility of lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender people as a social group.
African-American Music Appreciation Month	Immerse yourself in the music of your favorite black musicians. Discover new sounds and genres.

National Men's Health Week	Raise awareness about manageable steps men can take to improve their health.
Helen Keller Deaf-Blind Awareness Week	Helen Keller, America's most renowned and respected deaf-blind person. Her accomplishments serve as a beacon of courage and hope for our Nation, symbolizing what deaf-blind people can achieve. In order to encourage public recognition of and compassion for the complex problems caused by deafblindness and to emphasize the potential contribution of deaf-blind persons to our Nation, the last week in June is known as "Helen Keller Deaf-Blind Awareness Week."
National PTSD Awareness Month	Designated as the official month for PTSD awareness by the U.S. Senate in 2014, June is dedicated to raising awareness about issues related to PTSD and, reducing the stigma associated with the condition. <a href="National">National</a> PTSD Awareness Day is observed on June 27.
Anniversary of the Stonewall Riots	On June 28, 1969, police raided a gay bar in New York City, sparking the Stone Wall Riots that were largely led by LGBTQ+ people of color. These protests galvanized the modern day gay rights movement.



Independence Day	Anniversary of the US Declaration of Independence in 1776.
International Non-Binary People's Day	Raising awareness and organizing around the issues faced by non-binary people around the world while celebrating their contributions.
Bastille Day	French federal holiday that commemorates the Storming of the Bastille, a fortress-prison in Paris that held political prisoners who had displeased the French nobility. The Storming of the Bastille, which took place on July 14, 1789, was regarded as a turning point of the French Revolution. Celebrations are held throughout France.
Nelson Mandela International Day	Launched on July 18, 2009, in recognition of Nelson Mandela's birthday via unanimous decision of the U.N. General Assembly. It was inspired by a call Nelson Mandela made a year earlier for the next generation to take on the burden of leadership in addressing the world's social injustices: "It is in your hands now." It is more than a celebration of Mandela's life and legacy; it is a global movement to honor his life's work and to change the world for the better.
National Parents' Day (United States)	National Parents' Day was established in 1994 when President Bill Clinton signed a congressional Resolution to recognize the role of parents in raising their children.
Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) Day	Celebrating the 1990 signing of the ADA, which guarantees equal opportunity for people with disabilities.
Asalha Puja or Dharma Day	Celebration of Buddha's first teachings.
Hijri New Year	Marks the beginning of the new Islamic calendar year.

Philando Castile	Philando Castile was killed while out driving with his girlfriend in St Paul, Minnesota. He was pulled over by the police during a routine check, and told them he was licensed to carry a weapon, and had one in his possession.

National Down Syndrome Awareness Month	A time to celebrate people with Down syndrome and make others aware of their abilities and accomplishments.
Latinx Women's Equal Pay Day	Recognize that Latinx women have entered the workforce in record numbers and now number more than 11 million workers, they nonetheless face the largest wage gaps among women. Latinx women typically earn only 57 cents for every dollar earned by white, non-Hispanic men.

International Pronouns Day	Annual event that seeks to make sharing and respecting personal pronouns commonplace.
Intersex Awareness Day	Intersex people are born with sex characteristics (including genitals, gonads and chromosome patterns) that do not fit typical binary notions of male or female bodies. Intersex is an umbrella term used to describe a wide range of natural bodily variations. Intersex organizations bring attention to the challenges intersex individuals face, culminating in the Intersex Day of Remembrance on the birthday of Herculine Barbin, also sometimes known as Intersex Solidarity Day.
World Mental Health Day	International day for global mental health education, awareness and advocacy against social stigma.
World Teachers Day	To help give the world better understanding of teachers and the role they play in the development of students and society.
National Learning and Development Month	Encourages us to focus on broadening and advancing our skills.
Islamic Heritage Month	Held in October because it coincides with the Prophet Muhammad's birthday, began in 2005 with the opening of the Smithsonian Institution's America's Islamic Heritage exhibit, in which the museum displayed letters, copies of the Quran and other Muslim artifacts found in the country.
Atatiana Jefferson	Atatiana Koquice Jefferson, a 28-year-old woman, was shot to death in her home by a police officer. Police arrived at her home after a neighbor called a non-emergency number, stating that Jefferson's front door was open.
Pittsburgh synagogue shooting	A white supremacist terrorist mass shooting that took place on October 27, 2018, at the Tree of Life – Or L'Simcha Congregation[a] in the Squirrel Hill neighborhood of Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The suspect killed eleven people and wounded six, including several Holocaust survivors. It was the deadliest attack on the Jewish community in the United States.

Hanukkah	The Jewish eight-day "Festival of lights", celebrating the rededication of the Temple to the service of God in 164 BCE
Las Posadas	A 9 day Mexican tradition based on the story of Mary, Joseph, and their search for a safe place to stay before Jesus was born
Kwanzaa	7 day celebration honoring African American heritage and its continued vitality
Christmas Eve	Christmas Eve is the evening or entire day before Christmas Day, the festival commemorating the birth of Jesus
Christmas	Christmas is an annual festival commemorating the birth of Jesus Christ, observed primarily on December 25 as a religious and cultural celebration by billions of people around the world.

Wounded Knee Day	More than 200 Lakota Sioux were massacred by US troops at Wounded Knee in South Dakota
International Day for the Abolition of Slavery	Marks the date of the adoption, by the General Assembly, of the United Nations Convention for the Suppression of the Traffic in Persons and of the Exploitation of the Prostitution of others
